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WAGER HOLMES COLLECTION

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The following volumes and documents belonged to the Wager family of Great Longstone and relate to leadmining and other business in which they were engaged. Jasper Wager left them to his sister, whose son, Charles Wager Holmes, Esq., deposited them at Sheffield City Library, in 1962.

Account Books

These relate to lead-mining, general farming and the sale of meat, meal, coal and other general products, in all of which the Wagers appear to have been engaged. No pedigree of the Wager family of Great Longstone is available, but the first member of the family to appear in these books is Thomas Wager in the 1770s, followed by William Wager, probably his son. In the middle of the 19th century another William Wager carried on the family business and there are mentions of Anthony, Edmund and Jasper Wager. Several of the volumes have been analysed in detail by Mr. Robert Thornhill of Great Longstone, whose work on them is being stencilled by the Peak District Mines Historical Society. The volumes are listed below in two series but there is agood deal of overlapping. It is not always possible to read words written on the covers, which in any case are sometimes irrelevant to the contents.

Farming accounts and Sales

The following volumes are accounts connected with the Wagers' activities The greater number of them are cash books and ledgers of sales of meal, meat and other goods, mainly farm produce. In many cases in the ledgers, the goods are balanced against wages for agricultural work done.

Miscellaneous papers

- W.H.C.34. Contemporary copy of brief and depositions taken before Samuel Heathcote, Sept. 1738, in connection with an action in the Court of Kings Bench. It would appear to be part of the extensive proceedings connected with the Little Pasture mines case. This particular action concerns a complaint of hindering the Deputy Sheriff from executing a writ of fiere facias for possession of certain mines, assault, riotous assembly, etc., in connection therewith. Gives details of the riot.
- W.H.C.35. Packet of miscellaneous notes of accounts, invoices and odd letters, mainly concerning mining business. 1772-1830s.
- W.H.C.36. Letters and invoices from John Wakefield of Kendal to William Wager, for supplying gunpowder. The letters, which contain brief general comments on farming, mines etc., are on the invoice papers, 1822-27. Also odd papers concerning Mandale mine in the 1830s.
- W.H.C.37. Demand note for property tax addressed to William Wager as overseer and part owner of Longstone Edge Mine. 10 August, 1807.

Miscellaneous deeds and trust papers

- W.H.C.38. Articles of agreement. Mrs. Frances Abson of Mansfield Woodhouse (Notts.), widow, to Mr. Francis Hayward of Bakewell, innholder and Mr. William Wager of Gt. Longstone, miner. Frances Abson gives to the other parties full liberty and licence to search and dig for lead ore in her four closes in Folow in the parish of Eyam called Pasture Edge Close, Crow Close, Broomhill Close and Yard Close and to sink shafts except in the old vein worked by Mr. Bagshawe and Company; Hayward and Wager agree to pay her one twentieth part of all free ore and smytham digged in the said closes, and pay for all damages. After the said mines are clear of debt Mrs. Abson is to receive one sixteenth part. 19 June, 1790.
- W.H.C.39. Declaration of Trust. William Kitchen of Bramley in the parish of Bakewell, farmer, declares that £500 expended under a lease (recited) was the joint property of Kitchen and Matthew Frost of Hassop and agrees to surrender one half part of the interest in the leased premises when required.

 The recited lease is as follows:Francis Eyre, Earl of Newburgh, to William Kitchen. A parcel of land in Calver whereon a Water corn mill was lately standing with the sluice and dams and a private road to the same; for the purpose that Kitchen should erect a new stone mill, machine or engine within one year at a cost of £500; for 21 years at a rent of £20. 9 May, 1815.
- W.H.C.40. Release. The Legatees under the will of Matthew Frost, deceased, to William Wager and James Tissington, the executors. 1852.
- W.H.C.41. Sale Plan. Plan of the late Mr. Barke's property for sale.
 R. Goldsmith, surveyor on the Turnpike Road between Manchester and Ashton under Lyme. Barke is mentioned among the legatees in item 40.
