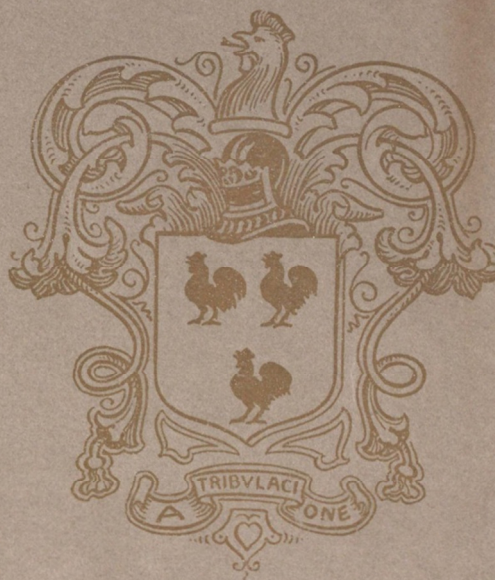

At two-thirty o'clock in the afternoon on
Wednesday, May the tenth, in the year one
thousand nine hundred and twenty-two.





The Inhabitants of Ashbourne,
desirous of showing their thank-
fulness and praise to Almighty God
for deliverance from their enemies,
and in grateful and undying remem-
brance of the brave men of their
town who have laid down their lives
for their Homes and Country, have
acquired this Land; laid out these
Recreation Grounds and erected
this Monument as a Memorial.

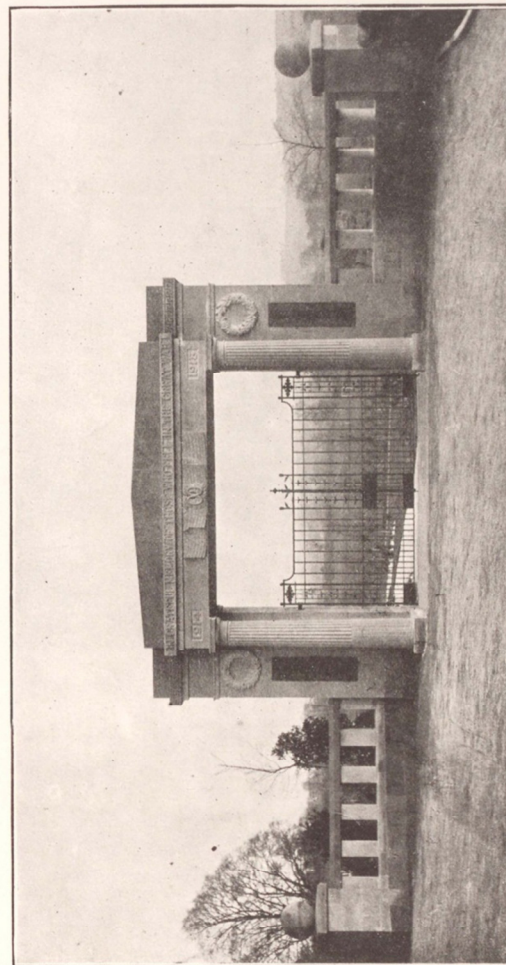

Short Description of the Memorial

The Memorial Arch is of massive construction, composed of selected Derbyshire Gritstone. It is of late Doric design, and dignified in its treatment.

It forms the main entrance to the Recreation Ground.

The opening is 12 feet wide, flanked with substantial buttresses, in the front of which stand two fluted and reeded columns, 10 feet high, with can and base. Above the columns rises the pediment, enriched with suitable mouldings, the total height being over 15 feet.

On the fascia over the gateway is carved a winged scarab, the emblem of the Infinite, with endless knot, the emblem of Perfect Love. Just above this is engraved the words "In Grateful Memory of those who fell in the Great War."

On the faces of the two buttresses are carved two Laurel Wreaths, which give an appropriate canopy to the Bronze Panels below, containing the names of the Fallen.

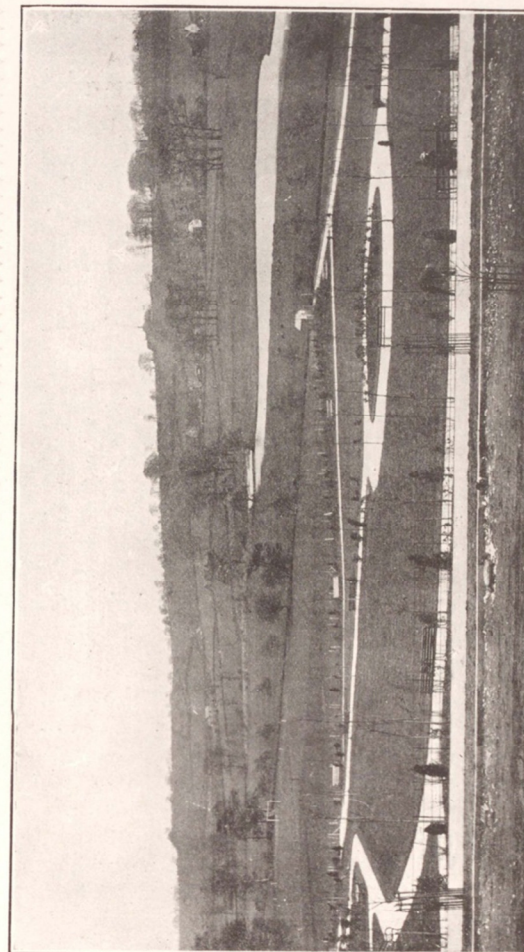

Above the wreaths there is a carved and fretted freize.

The dates 1914—1918 are engraved on the facia over the gateway.

Flanking the arch, and forming a handsome contribution to the whole, are two circular balustraded Wing Walls with terminal posts and balls, rising to a height of 4ft. 6ins.

The whole of the work in connection with the Memorial Arch was executed by Messrs. R. G. Lomas & Son, Monumental Masons, Derby.

The Recreation Ground is divided into two portions and contains about $6\frac{1}{2}$ acres, one portion of which is intended to be used as a Sports Ground, and Children's Playground, and the remainder has been laid out as Ornamental Gardens, with winding paths, consisting of a main Avenue of Limes with a 10 feet wide walk from the Memorial Arch leading to the sports ground, and over 500 yards of other walks.

About 1,000 ornamental trees and shrubs have been planted in great variety.

Oak Entrance Gates have been provided in Park Road, and near the Memorial Arch.

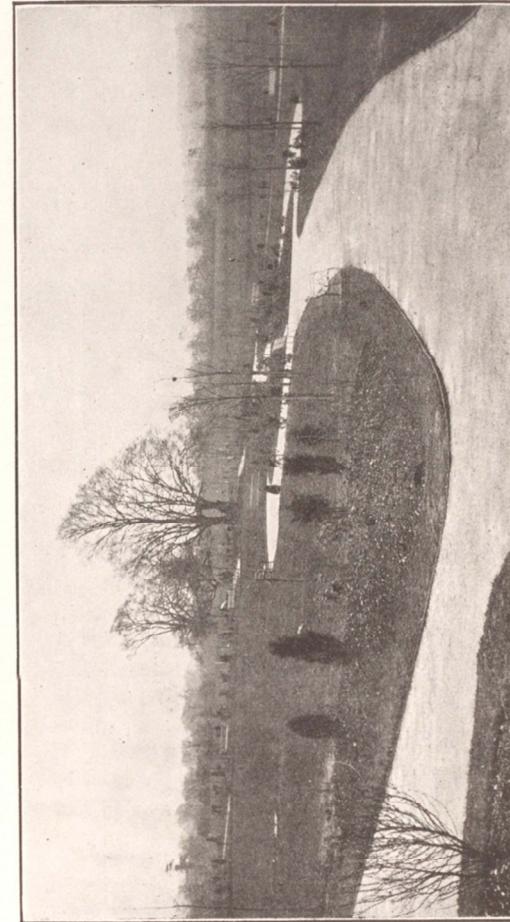

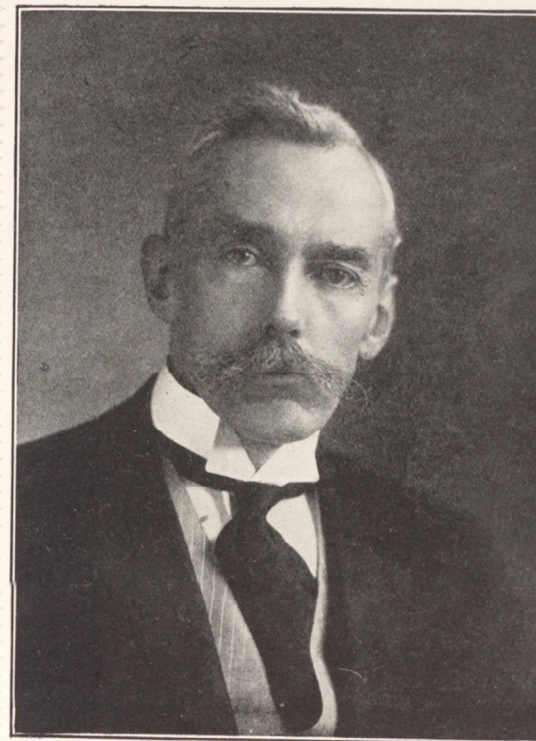

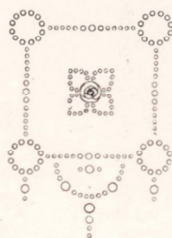
