Robert Allsop for the last two seasons i.e. 1st April to 1st December 1916 -17 has been employed by the Gratton Cheese Factory, of Gratton Winster, Matlock to look after 300 pigs which are fattened each season for market. It has been the custom for many years to engage the employees of the Gratton Cheese Factory on the 1st Jany. each year for the season commencing the 1st April and Allsop was duly engaged this year. Owing to the difficulty experienced for many years in getting an efficient man to manage this large herd of pigs and the serious losses sustained in improper feeding and bad management it was decided in 1916 to train Allsop for the work and he is now an efficient manager. At the termination of one pig feeding season until the commencement of the next and during pig feeding season when time permits Allsop assists his father, Mr John Allsop on his farm of 37 acres and also a neighbour, Mr Flewitt, on his farm of 308 acres. Mr John Allsop, who does not enjoy the best of health, keeps 9 milk cows, and 7 young stock in addition to sheep, and has 14 acres of hay and corn to harvest. The arable land is 2 miles away from home. Mr Allsop has no other assistance. Mr Flewitt has 24 acres of arable land and a further 10 acres are being broken up this season.

The Gratton Cheese Factory produces about 60 tons of cheese during the season and in order to prevent waste the whey which is taken from the milk in the manufacture of the cheese is the main food used for fattening the pigs, and approximately ^{40 tons} of bacon are produced during the season.

Additional land has been taken this season in order to increase the number of pigs and thus help the food production in the country.

The only other employee of the Cheese Factory is the Manager who has his time fully occupied in making the cheese and he cannot look after the pigs, and if Allsop has to join the Colours, unless an efficient substitute can be obtained, it will not be possible to fatten the pigs with the result that there will be a shortage of at least 40 tons of bacon from this supply and the valuable whey will be wasted.
